Statewide School Bond History

The Coalition for Adequate School Housing (C.A.S.H.) was founded in 1978 to advocate for K-12 facilities funding and better school facilities in California. C.A.S.H. began as a coalition of existing statewide organizations with a membership of a few dozen school districts. Over the years, C.A.S.H. has grown to more than one thousand public and private sector members, making it the largest statewide organization focused exclusively on school facilities issues.

C.A.S.H. pursues an extensive agenda each legislative session. C.A.S.H. advocates and tracks hundreds of bills in pursuit of the organization's goals and to protect the gains C.A.S.H. has achieved over the years. C.A.S.H. also pursues an extensive regulatory agenda in furtherance of its goals.

C.A.S.H. takes great pride in its relationship with state agencies that are integral to K-12 school facilities, including:

Murdoch, Walrath and Holmes has represented C.A.S.H. since 1981. James L. Murdoch, founder of the firm, was the first lobbyist to represent C.A.S.H. and continued to work on behalf of the organization until his death in October 2002. He is credited with shaping C.A.S.H. into the influential statewide organization that it is today.

While C.A.S.H. has experienced considerable success with its legislative goals, the most significant achievement of the organization is the passage of statewide bonds. Under C.A.S.H. leadership, 15 statewide bond issues have been placed on the ballot since 1982. All but one of these issues was approved by the voters of California, for a total of \$52.68 billion in facilities funding.

Legislative and Regulatory Focus

In 2006, the second part of a two-year session, C.A.S.H. continued with an aggressive legislative and regulatory platform. One of C.A.S.H.'s most important objectives for 2006 was to ensure that Proposition 1D was approved by the voters. We are pleased to report that Proposition 1D was overwhelmingly approved on November 7, making almost \$7.4 billion available to build and renovate K-12 schools statewide.

C.A.S.H.'s other significant objectives for 2006, such as an increase in the School Facilities Program (SFP) base grant, were included in the legislation that placed Proposition 1D on the ballot. It is important to note that in 2005, C.A.S.H. contracted for a study of unfunded requirements when building schools funded under the SFP. This study helped paint a picture of unfunded or inadequately funded requirements that have been imposed on school districts and county offices since the passage of SB 50 in 1998. The study provided an impetus for C.A.S.H.'s successful advocacy efforts on this issue.

C.A.S.H. also successfully advocated for inclusion of programs and funding in Proposition 1D to address specific issues such as overcrowded conditions, necessary seismic upgrades, access compliance and facilities conducive to training tomorrow's workforce through career-technical education.

The C.A.S.H. legislative staff is comprised of eight experienced advocates and consultants. The legislative team has extensive knowledge of K-12 school facilities issues and the legislative process. C.A.S.H. tracks legislation, regulation, policy, and new trends impacting school facilities approval, funding, construction, and maintenance in California. The C.A.S.H. legislative staff works with elected officials, agency representatives, other associations, and individual school districts to pursue the C.A.S.H. legislative platform and guiding agenda.

Following are the packages pursued in 2006:

Grant Allowances and Related Issues

Legislative Vehicles: **AB 670 (Goldberg) and AB 127 (Núñez, Perata)**

The per pupil grant amounts for elementary, middle and high school pupils long have been considered to be low in comparison to the cost of schools in today's high cost bid environment.

2006 grant increases for New Construction and a process for future grant increases were included in AB 127, which was signed by the Governor.

Portable Classrooms

Legislative Vehicle: **SB 1203 (Morrow) and Regulatory Change**

C.A.S.H. sought to address issues relating to portable classrooms, including:

- a. Portable classroom chargeability,
- b. District purchase of post-1992 state emergency classrooms, and
- c. Allow districts to replace portable buildings of any age.

The issue was addressed through regulations.

CEQA and DTSC Issues Requiring Legislative Attention

Legislative Vehicles: **AB 2834 (Runner) and SB 1814 (Torlakson)**

CEQA options for school districts and DTSC requirement modifications lead with success.

SB 1814 on CEQA was signed by the Governor.

Enrollment Projection Method

Legislative Vehicle: **AB 1416 (Goldberg)**

C.A.S.H. sought to develop options for projecting enrollment to establish eligibility for participation in the School Facility Program (SFP).

This bill was held in the Senate.

Public Contract Code

Legislative Vehicles: **AB 2832 (Runner) and AB 2833 (Runner)**

C.A.S.H. sought to amend the Public Contract Code relative to three items related to:

- a. Pre-qualification,
- b. Construction bid limit, and
- c. Allow the 10% change order limit to be applied in the aggregate for multi-prime contracts.

These bills were held in committee.

C.A.S.H. Legislative Activity for 2006:

- C.A.S.H. followed 51 legislative and regulatory issues;
- C.A.S.H. tracked over 268 facilities-related bills; and
- C.A.S.H. actively lobbied 41 bills and took positions on 26.

Operations

In 2006, operations for the association were busy and were received with great success. The C.A.S.H. School Facilities Leadership Academy was launched with high praise. We had a banner year, with workshops and conferences presenting timely topics and information to our members. The revised breakout programs for the Spring and Fall conferences brought more hands-on information to our members. We updated our web site to bring our members easy online invoice payment and include the Legislative Directory.

C.A.S.H. School Facilities Leadership Academy

With only one year of planning, we launched the School Facilities Leadership Academy with our partner, Fiscal Crisis Management Assistance Team (FCMAT). The vision and curriculum is now being delivered to 25 participants from around the state to pave their way as school facility leaders. These participants started their journey with a three-day institute in early August. At the time of this report, they are half-way through the first year. The Steering Committee has worked tirelessly to ensure delivery of a rigorous program. Feedback from the participants will help to modify the curriculum for the second cohort. Fashioning the Academy after FCMAT's CBO Mentor Project, we have matched each participant with a mentor. The mentor reviews the participant's homework and assists with questions along the way.

As we look to the future of the Academy, C.A.S.H. will continue collaboration with FCMAT. In particular, we are exploring a larger financial commitment to assist with costs associated in funding this endeavor. We will also strive to keep continuity in the second year by utilizing the same core faculty. Applications for the second cohort will be distributed at the C.A.S.H. Annual Conference in February. We look forward to the continued success of the Academy for many years to come.
